Supervisors Act To Care For County Unfortu-

The Westchester County Tubercu lar Hospital, for which State officials and a long list of waiting patients have pleaded for years, took one step nearer actuality yesterday alternoon when the Board of Supervisors on the motion of Supervisor George W. Smyth of Yonkers voted to appropriate immediately \$2,150,-000 for the construction and equipment of the buildings.

Supervisor Smyth, whose work aware of tubercular conditions in county, explained the need for the new pavilions and declared that when completed the new hospital would represent the finest institution in the entire United States.

He was followed by Democratic Minority Leader James Sullivan of Yonkers, who said every member of the Board should vote for the appropriation in order to relieve the need for additional facilities for treatment of this disease.

The resolution and act passed by the Board call for appropriations to meet the various contracts which are awarded by the resolution.

However, Croton has one ecourse to increase its supply and that is by cutting off water t supplies at times to the Harmon railroad shops. The railroad has its own supply at Oscawana, but in the summer time, this supply, which isn't so good, runs out, necessitating using Croton water.
